Training the Future Workforce

McMinnville School District has one of the most robust vocational/technical offerings in the state. With 16 Career Pathway programs, we encourage every high school student to participate in a pathway because we believe it benefits both the student and the community.

As part of their class schedules, students can explore a field of interest or find new interests.

MSD offers internships, mentor partnerships and other supports to launch graduates into life after high school, whether the students are headed to college, trade school, vocational training or straight into the workforce. The district also actively seeks opportunities for training.

Last spring, the district was offered a chance to train

recent Mac High graduates to become certified heavy equipment operators, which are in high demand in Oregon. Funded by a grant from the Willamette Workforce Partnership, the classes included two weeks of training in a simulator that let students learn equipment while watching the machinery respond on a screen. The third week of training was spent running bulldozers and clearing debris from a former hazelnut orchard adjacent to Grandhaven Elementary.

Looking for Substitutes

Do you like working around children? We have a number of substitute positions available for people who want a flexible, part-time schedule.

Retired teachers with active teaching licenses may register through Edustaff.org to substitute. Individuals who hold a bachelor's degree and have not completed a teacher preparation program may qualify for a restricted substitute teaching license under MSD's sponsorship. Edustaff-registered subs (including current ones) can earn a bonus!

There are non-teaching positions available as well, including educational assistants, custodians, secretaries and bus drivers.

Academic Progress

MSD is working to minimize the impact of unfinished learning due to the pandemic.

Before the school closures, MSD planned to create reading and math acceleration groups for all elementary students using Student Success Act funding, later bolstered by the emergency pandemic funds provided to schools. These small-learning groups allow more focused attention for students. The district also added staff to double the time that middle school

students spend in math class, which gives all students an additional boost.

This year, we also launched schoolbased Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). This allows staff to work together and share teaching strategies that have the most impact on student learning. PLCs meet every Wednesday. Elementary students are released an hour early, at 1:30 p.m., and middle and high school students start an hour later, at about 9:30 a.m.

While student test scores are down across the country, and MSD scores are still above state average, our goal is always to improve!

The survey will help us prioritize our efforts to best use our precious funding dollars. Our funding comes from the State School Fund with additional funding from the Student Success Act, which was passed by the Oregon legislature in 2019. A portion of the Student Success Act is intended to focus on student mental and behavioral health, address academic disparities, and improve teaching and learning conditions.
