MHS College Credit Now program prepares students for college, offers low-cost credits

McMinnville High School's College Credit Now (CCN) program allows students to earn college credits from their high school courses in partnership with Chemeketa Community College. CCN provides a substantial cost savings to students. MHS students paid approximately \$25 per year for dual college credit courses in 2013-14. The estimated cost savings to students that year was \$678,705 in comparable tuition costs at an Oregon public university. The CCN program has grown by 537% since it started in 2000. This year, 58 courses are available.



Students learned new music skills at summer music camps

McMinnville students enjoyed new opportunities to learn music skills over the summer. The first annual summer music camp program took place in August. Students worked on choir, instrumental and marching band skills. K-12 choir students performed for all staff at the back-to-school inservice in late August.

District programs are models of science, technology, engineering instruction

McMinnville was one of three public school programs in the nation to be recognized as a 2014 National Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Showcase. The district was commended by the U.S. Dept. of Education for its comprehensive K-12 STEM program that features vibrant community-based teaching and learning experiences, after-school robotics teams, and the Engineering and Aerospace Sciences Academy.



Facilities planning committee studies school building needs

A citizen-based facilities committee is reviewing district buildings to make recommendations for possible improvements. Some facilities, such as Cook and Adams, are older and have maintenance needs that must be addressed.

In 2012, architects assessed each facility and made a detailed list of the immediate and long-term needs of each, including issues related to pipes and roofs.

The District's 2006 bond replaced portions of the old Newby and Memorial buildings with new construction and added a classroom wing at the high school to deal with district-wide capacity challenges.

Today, McMinnville High School has an enrollment of 2,036 students and remains among the larger high schools in the state. While the new portion of MHS meets many high school program needs, the older portion of the facility needs to be addressed in addition to upgrades at older facilities.

Consultants are helping to prioritize repairs for each building, and the committee is reviewing costs, funding possibilities, enrollment projections and program needs, especially at MHS.

Stephanie was recognized for her leadership qualities and the high student achievement at Buel. She and her staff focus on:

1. Academic achievement
2. Clear curriculum choices
3. Frequent assessment of student progress and multiple opportunities for improvement
4. Nonfiction writing
5. Collaborative scoring of student work

Under her leadership, Buel's student achievement scores have significantly exceeded state averages. Sue Buel Elementary School has been recognized as a model school for a third consecutive year.
