From the Superintendent



Work on construction projects approved by voters in the May, 2016 Facilities Bond is proceeding on schedule. It will be a busy summer, since much of the work must be done while school is out of session. This means that some schools or some areas within schools will be unavailable for community use. Details of the work that will be occurring this summer and

the impact on building usage can be found on pages 2 and 3 of this newsletter, including building closures, estimates of closure dates, bond work occurring in each facility, and changes to summer programing.

Over spring break, the District Administrative Office moved to the former Cook Elementary School, which is nearing completion of seismic upgrades, repairs, and renovations.

Though construction inevitably presents some challenges to work around, our students will benefit from improved facilities purposefully designed to maximize learning. We are grateful for the support of the community, which continues to put the needs of students first and foremost.

At the state level, a commitment to put the needs of students first and foremost is less apparent. The legislature is currently holding hearings and debating funding levels for K-12 education. In fact, I testified before the Oregon legislature on Feb. 21st and March 16th to advocate for increased school funding.

The Co-Chairs proposed education funding level of \$7.8 billion over the 2017-19 biennium would result in a funding shortfall of approximately \$4.2 million per year for each of the next two years for the McMinnville School District.

Achieving Excellence in Education

The Governor's proposed education budget of \$8.02 billion would create a district revenue shortfall of \$2.85 million per year for each of the next two years. Either shortfall would result in reductions that could impact class size, reduce instructional days, or decrease the staffing of specialists in our schools. Oregon already ranks 39th in the country in education funding and we also have one of the shortest school years in the country. Now is not the time to be cutting school funding, especially given the renewed strength of the Oregon economy, and it's certainly not the time to further shorten the school year.

If the state were to fund K-12 education at \$8.40 billion over the 17-19 biennium, the district's funding shortfall would be reduced to \$500,000 a year, which could be made up with reserve funds, thereby maintaining current programs. A statewide funding level of \$8.93 billion would allow the district to return to the program levels achieved nearly a decade ago. This would better support the district to meet state standards by providing intervention support, reducing class size, and offering extended day/year learning opportunities.

A funding level of \$9.97 billion would meet the Quality Education Model recommended by the Quality Education Commission, a commission on which I serve. At that level, the district could add instructional days, establish effective class sizes at all levels, provide high quality professional development, expand technologyrich teaching and learning, and provide extended day/year learning opportunities. Funding the Quality Education Model would significantly improve public education in Oregon over time.

Graduation rate data for 2016, recently released by the Oregon Department of Education, indicates that McMinnville High School was among the top performing schools in the state for the overall graduation rate and, in particular, a top performer among high schools serving historically at-risk populations.
